The Fire Department received an MVP award from WDTN Operation Football after being nominated by the Stebbins High School Football Team. Our crews enjoy getting out and

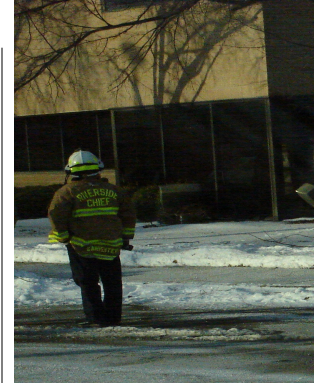
supporting the community. The award is much appreciated. Good luck Indians!

Training with CareFlight

Premier Health employs four CareFlight helicopters which carry one pilot, two flight nurses, and two patients and can travel at up to 180 mph making them among the fastest medical helicopters.

On September 28th, Care Flight landed one of their helicopters

next to Station 5 during a training exercise. Care Flight staff reviewed landing procedures, communications, patient loading, and other important information with fire department personnel. Riverside crews had the opportunity to perform practical cot loading techniques while the

helicopter was on site. We thank the CareFlight staff for taking the time to meet and train with our personnel.

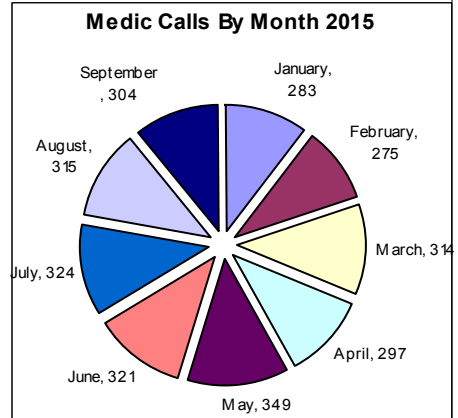
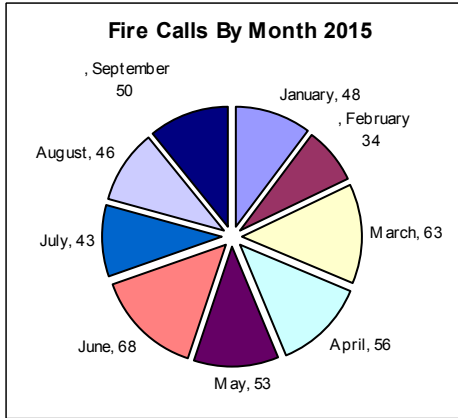
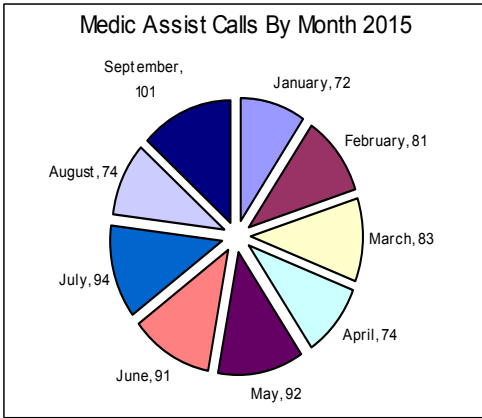
